




Thefts from cars

SMALL amounts of cash and a phone charger were stolen from four unlocked cars in Portland South overnight Sunday.

Cars parked in Flinders and Short streets, Arkell Court and Cape Nelson Rd were looted between 8pm Sunday and 8am Monday.

Acting Sergeant Sean Elliott said a 15 and 16-year-old were arrested at 5.30am in Short St, in possession of a stolen bicycle, and were later questioned by police at the station.

The two youths were charged with theft of the bike and unlawfully entering premises in Short St, and were released on summons.

The two youths will be further questioned in relation to the thefts from motor vehicles Acting Sgt Elliott said.

He said there were a number of other incidents that occurred in Short St on Sunday night which were also being investigated.

One Short St resident told the *Portland Observer* that their neighbour's dog had been cut with a knife after people entered their back-yard on Sunday night.

Anyone with information about the thefts from cars or any other incidents are urged to contact Portland police on 5523 1999 or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

Acting Sgt Elliott reminded all motorists to keep their vehicles locked at all times and not to leave valuables in them or visible from the outside.



Possible resolution of school issues cannot be confirmed

RUMOURS that concerns surrounding the Portland Bay School may be resolved at the beginning of Term 2 have not been confirmed.

Department of Education and Early Childhood Development acting district manager Peter Henry said he couldn't confirm if there was any investigation, as per DEECD regulations, but said hypothetically if there were an investigation, the department would not make a public statement at the end, citing the reason for that as "personal privacy and confidentiality".

School council vice-president Debbie Robinson said she had not heard when the process would be resolved, but was hoping to learn something early in Term 2.

President Kathryn Beaglehole is in the middle of a 10-week leave-of-absence from council responsibilities for health reasons and declined to comment.

Community concerns and teachers' complaints have been gathering at the school since the end of 2012, made to the DEECD through the Australian Education Union, Community and Public Sector Union and directly by parents.

Mr Henry visited Portland on February 11 for a meeting with an individual parent and a senior representative of school council, which "was very useful in terms of clarifying my understanding".

In late February, Mr Nugent said there were regular closed meetings being held between the DEECD and a cross section of parties.
